What is Remote Therapeutic Monitoring (RTM)?

- RTM allows providers to bill for the remote management of their patients with musculoskeletal and respiratory conditions using medical devices (including certain software) that collect nonphysiological data, such as patient adherence and reported pain levels.
- Prescribing education and home exercise programs to patients is standard practice for rehab therapists, but until now, providers haven't been incentivized to interact with patients between sessions to monitor and encourage adherence to their home programs.





Why implement RTM?

- This digital platform improves access to care, patient outcomes and engagement.
- Supports our goal to deliver high quality care, efficiently for less.



Stoughton Health, RTM and Next Steps:

Stoughton Health chose Medbridge as our software platform

- Provides videos for each exercise and has a comprehensive education database to utilize
- The rehab department is currently piloting the workflow with full implementation/Go live target of August 25th, 2022.
- Next Steps:
 - Incorporate RTM with Dr. Rawal's Wisconsin Shoulder Center program
 - Provide patient education prior to surgery
 - Incorporate outcome data collection

Side Stepping with Resistance at Ankles REPS: 10 | SETS: 1 | DAILY: 1 | WEEKLY: 7

Setup

Begin standing upright with a resistance band looped around your ankles. Bend your knees slightly so you are in a mini squat position.

Movement Slowly step sideways, maintaining tension in the band.

Tip Make sure to keep your feet pointing straight forward and do not let your knees collapse inward during the exercise.



Mini Squat with Counter Support

REPS: 10 | SETS: 1 | HOLD: 1 | DAILY: 2 | WEEKLY: 7

Setup

Begin in a standing upright position with your feet shoulder width apart and your hands resting on a counter.

Movement

Slowly bend your knees to lower into a mini squat position. Hold briefly, then press into your feet to return to a standing upright position and repeat.

Tip

Make sure to keep your heels on the ground and use the counter to help you balance as needed. Do not let your knees bend forward past your toes or collapse inward.



Quadruped Alternating Arm Lift

REPS: 10 | SETS: 1 | DAILY: 1 | WEEKLY: 7

Setup Begin on all fours with your arms under your shoulders and knees under your hips.

Movement

Raise one arm forward with your thumb pointing toward the ceiling. Hold briefly, then lower it back to the starting position and repeat with your opposite arm.

Tip

Make sure to keep your back straight and maintain a gentle chin tuck during the exercise. Do not let your trunk rotate while moving your arm.

Why implement a Pulmonary Rehab Pilot?

- > 2013 American Thoracic Society/European Respiratory Society statement:
 - Pulmonary rehabilitation is a comprehensive intervention based on a thorough patient assessment followed by patient-tailored therapies that include, but are not limited to, exercise training, education and behavior changes, designed to improve the physical and psychological condition of people with chronic respiratory disease and to promote the long-term adherence to health-enhancing behaviors"
 - Rationale for PR- greatest benefits
 - Symptom relief
 - Exercise tolerance
 - Improving health related quality of life
 - Emerging data saying it also reduces health care utilization and expenditures




Why now and benefits for Stoughton Health?

- Increase in patients experiencing Covid - Long Haul symptoms
- Current evidence/research suggests best outcomes come through pulmonary rehab program
- Benefits:
 - Increased utilization of PFT (Pulmonary function tests)
 - Improves efficiency within cardiac rehab department
 - Potential physical therapy maintenance referrals










Space Issues

- Need for Multi-specialty Clinic space area
 - General Surgery/Wound Clinic functioning out of Day Surgery area
 - Addition of new providers (Cardiology, Urology, Podiatry) in current Urgent Care footprint
 - Provides additional space for Urgent Care services
- Rehab Services located off-site
 - Leasing space currently
 - Road work impacting access
- Current Operating Rooms 47 years old and connected to the 1975 building
- Cardiac Rehab Services has safety concerns with equipment spacing in current location

Patient Volumes/Growth Needs

- Census reports indicate 1.8% growth in Stoughton by 2026
- Increased Urgent Care needs
- Expect 3-5% growth in Ortho each year and addition of shoulder program radius
- Increased patient volumes with additional physician clinic services (Podiatry and Elective Sterilization services)
- Expect more Rehab patients with pelvic floor and hand therapy needs
- Potential addition of Pulmonary Rehab with covid long-haulers
- Increased need for Cardiac Rehab Phase II
- Increased outpatient surgical needs
- Potential for chemotherapy ambulatory infusion

Cost Savings/Efficiency

- SWAC Rehab Lease Cost Savings
 - \$132,000 annual cost savings
- Staff and equipment efficiency
 - Cardiac Rehab and Outpatient Rehab services
 - Reduced FTE in Registration staff
 - Medical Imaging and Rehab proximity to Ortho & General Surgery
 - Medical Imaging staff dedicated to serving the medical office needs
- Shelled space allows for growing into the future as needs arise




Proposed Board Committee Structure



Capital Request: Razing of House Properties (Michelle Abey)

- Stoughton Health has obtained ownership of one block of house properties (709 Ridge St., 205 N. Lynn St., and 121 N. Lynn St.).
- Costs to renovate house properties to meet code standards is considerably higher than razing due to their dilapidated state.
- Recommend hiring the following contractors:
 - Mandt Sandfill Trucking & Excavating for razing homes: \$68,800
 - Dirty Ducts for asbestos abatement: \$7,040
 - May incur additional costs for tree/shrub removal (to be determined at time of demolition)
- Recommend approval of unbudgeted FY2022 capital expenditure not to exceed \$82,000 for razing of homes, asbestos abatement, and tree/shrub removal.







Capital Request: Boiler Burner Replacement (Michelle Abey)

- Current boilers are approximately 20 years old. The burner assembly seals are worn and leaking and controls are outdated. Current boiler burners are becoming costly due to the need for replacing individual parts as this dated equipment is becoming obsolete.
- Recommendation to replace boiler burners including the optional items listed on the quote. Goal would be to replace one unit in September and installation of the second unit to follow immediately thereafter.
- Recommend approval to replace boiler burners for cost not to exceed \$200,000.






